REGULATIONS FOR EXHIBITORS

- 1 Intending exhibitors will be required to give notice, as stated at beginning of each Section, on the enclosed entry form. Entry fees as stated in the Schedule must be paid to the Entry Secretary when bringing your entries to the Show.
- 2 A limited number of vases are available for loan to exhibitors. These must be returned to the Steward at the close of the Show.
- 3 Exhibitors will receive from the Entry Secretary details of their exhibitor's number and a Lifting Ticket.
- 4 **Staging times are 3.00pm to 9.00pm Friday 5th August 2011 and between 7.00am to 8.45am prompt for judging on Saturday 6th August 2011.**
- 5 All prizes awarded are at the discretion of the judges.
- 6 All Classes (except Floral Art and Children's Classes) must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor and must have been in his or her possession at least three months prior to the Show. The Committee reserve the right to examine the garden or greenhouse of any exhibitor prior to and after the Show.
- 7 There will be no limit to the number of entries and prizes won by an exhibitor.
- 8 Unless otherwise stated all trophies awarded are to be held for a period of one year.
- 9 All exhibits must be correctly named and in accordance with the Schedule. Errors in naming do not actually disqualify, but judges should recognise correctness and distinctness of naming as telling in favour of an exhibitor in a close competition.
- 10 If any exhibitor attempts to deceive the judges, or infringes any of the Society's regulations or otherwise seeks to gain prizes by unfair means, he or she shall forfeit all claims to all prizes which may have been awarded to him or her. The Committee reserve to themselves the right to refuse further entries from such exhibitors. Any protest must be made in writing and lodged with the Secretary not later than 3 o'clock on the first day of the Show, along with a deposit of £1. Failing the deposit no protest will be entertained. The deposit will be returned if the protest is upheld.
- 11 No exhibit must be removed before 5pm on the last day of the Show.
- 12 The Committee will not be responsible for any loss or damage to exhibits from whatsoever cause arising. All exhibits and articles must be at the sole risk of their respective owners.
- 13 The Committee is empowered to settle any dispute which may arise and its decision shall be final.
- 14 Due to financial constraints the Society can no longer pay the cost of engraving trophies.

Semi-double flowers should be exhibited in classes for single flower fuchsias.

2. All plants must be the property of the exhibitor and have been in his or her possession for at least three months prior to the show. Plants must be shown in the final sized pots or containers in which they have been grown.
3. All plants must be clean and free of pests and disease. Plants with obvious infestation will be removed from the show.
4. All exhibits must be correctly and legibly named. If an exhibitor does not know the name of the cultivar or species it should be labelled "Unknown".
5. Any protest must be made within one hour of the show opening to the public and any such protest will be considered by such members of the Committee as are present. Any Committee Member having an interest in the objection or dispute cannot act.
6. To facilitate watering of the plants during the Show, all pots must be contained in appropriately sized plant pot saucers.
7. CATCH-ALL- CLASS: This class is designed to allow what are considered the more unusual cultivars, e.g. inter-specific types and cultivars that show uncommon characteristics. The good spirit of the exhibitor and judge will make this possible.
n.b. This class is not intended for plants that can be exhibited elsewhere in the show, no matter how difficult they are to grow or shape.

8. A full basket: The basket must be commercially manufactured as a hanging basket. The maximum across shall not exceed 16" (406mm).
n.b. Full baskets may have flat bottoms, solid bases and straight sides..
9. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to ensure that exhibits are entered and staged in the correct class.
10. With the exception of Classes 262, 263 and 269, all classes will be judged to BFS guidelines.



- 6 LABELS. No label other than those supplied by the Entries Secretary must be affixed to the bottles. A small tie-on tag or label must be on the neck of the bottle bearing the entrants name, address and competitor's number, to be removed by entry steward on receipt of each entry.
- 7 EXHIBITORS. Exhibitors may enter only one bottle per class, and no single bottle may be entered in more than one class. Entries from person of the same surname and address but different initials will be accepted.
- 8 FORTIFICATION. All wines must have been made by the exhibitor by the simple process of fermentation and fortification by any other means is not allowed.
- 9 TASTING. No exhibit may be tasted or in any other way interfered with whilst on show, except by judges while judging. If for any reason it is found necessary to vary this rule it will only be in the presence of the Convener of judges together with a Member of the Society's Committee.

- 10 COLLECTION. Exhibits may only be removed by the entrant or person acting on his or her behalf and in possession of the collection slip. No other person other than the Steward may remove any exhibit from the Show table and all bottles must be checked out before removal from the Hall. No exhibit may be taken before 5pm on Sunday 7th August.
- 11 WINE ENTRIES. Exhibitors are requested to write the main ingredients of the Wine on the entry card received at the Show.
